

L.O. To translate Latin verbs by ending

We can translate a Latin verb by looking at the end to see who is doing it, and at the beginning to see what is happening. For example,

amamus

‘ama’ from ‘amare’ to love ‘mus’ means ‘we’

so ‘amamus’ means ‘we love’

Can you say what the following Latin verbs mean by look at the beginning to see what’s happening and the end to see who’s doing it? The first one has been done to show you how.

1. amat *he, she or it loves*
2. video **I see**

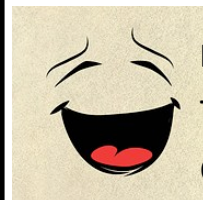
