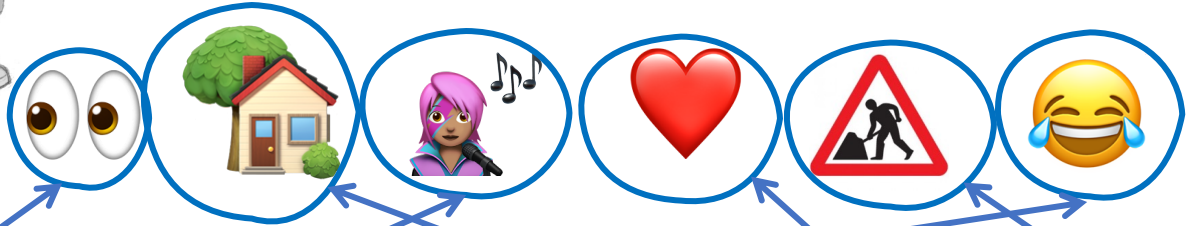




Can you match the picture up with the correct Latin word and say what it means in English? I've done one to show you how.
