an account of the order things happened, from the Greek 'chronos' meaning 'time'

the French for Tuesday, derived from the Latin 'Martis dies' ('day of Mars')

when the day and night are the same length, from the Latin 'aequus' ('equal') and 'nox' (night)

an imaginary line through the middle of something

the east, from the Latin 'oriens' meaning 'rising' because the sun rises in the east

the two-headed Roman god who gives his name to the month of January

happening at twilight, from the Latin 'crepusculum' ('twilight')

before midday

someone who has reached 100 years of age

the Spanish for Thursday, derived from the Latin 'Iovis dies' ('day of Jupiter')
